People keep asking me the same question

"Why are you running for Assembly?"
The answer is simple, because

I LOVE CROWN HEIGHTS

This is where many of us raise our families, send our children to school, daven, shop, work, and build our lives. We care deeply about our neighborhood and the future we leave for the next generation.

Over the years, I've watched major decisions affecting our community move forward without enough community involvement. Large development projects, transportation changes, housing plans, and policies affecting our schools and institutions are often discussed and decided long before many residents even know what's happening.

Too often, people feel they have no voice in the process.

THAT HAS TO CHANGE

Recently, I spoke with several experienced political leaders outside of Crown Heights. They all told me the same thing:

Regardless of who wins this election, a strong turnout for an independent Crown Heights candidate would send a powerful message.

It would show that Crown Heights voters think for themselves.

That we vote based on issues, not political pressure.

And perhaps most importantly, that our community is not controlled by a handful of unelected, self-appointed leaders.

THIS ELECTION IS BIGGER THAN ME IT'S BIGGER THAN ONE ASSEMBLY SEAT

It's about whether Crown Heights will continue to be spoken for by others or whether Crown Heights will speak for itself.

Many people don't realize how much influence an Assemblyman actually has.

Your Assemblyman votes on state laws and the state budget.

He helps secure funding for schools, security programs, community institutions, and local projects. He advocates for residents dealing with state agencies and has a voice when decisions affecting our community are made in Albany.

The question is:

WHO SHOULD THAT VOICE BELONG TO?

Someone who appears every two years asking for your vote and then disappears back to Albany?

Or someone who lives here, understands the community, and experiences these issues every day?

I believe your Assemblyman should be someone you see in shul, on Kingston Avenue, at school drop-off, and at community events. Someone who doesn't need a briefing to understand what's happening in the neighborhood because he lives it.

Government should not require gatekeepers.

Residents should not have to rely on a small circle of insiders to have their concerns heard.

One of the reasons I decided to run is because I have watched too many important decisions affecting Crown Heights move forward without enough transparency.

Today, there are proposals that could dramatically change parts of our neighborhood, including large-scale housing and shelter developments that could bring significant new density into the community.

Whether someone supports or opposes a particular project is not the point.

RESIDENTS DESERVE

ACCURATE INFORMATION, MEANINGFUL COMMUNITY INPUT AND ELECTED OFFICIALS WHO ARE WILLING TO ASK TOUGH QUESTIONS, DEMAND ACCOUNTABILITY, AND MAKE SURE GROWTH IS PLANNED RESPONSIBLY.,

Development affects traffic, parking, schools, infrastructure, public safety, and quality of life. The people who live here deserve a seat at the table before those decisions are finalized.

The same principle applies to Kingsbrook Shul.

For generations, Kingsbrook Shul has been an important part of the history and identity of our community. Today, many residents are concerned that this historic institution could be lost as development moves forward.

I believe every possible avenue should be explored to preserve Kingsbrook Shul, honor commitments that have been made, and find solutions that protect both community heritage and responsible development.

Once pieces of our history disappear, they cannot be replaced.

I also believe our yeshivos deserve stronger support from Albany.

Thousands of families struggle under the burden of tuition while our schools and community institutions continue to provide enormous value to the families they serve.

WE NEED

STRONGER ADVOCACY FOR EDUCATION FUNDING, SECURITY GRANTS, INFRASTRUCTURE SUPPORT, AND PROGRAMS THAT HELP OUR SCHOOLS THRIVE.

I believe our shuls, mosdos, and community organizations deserve their fair share of state resources.

And I believe government should help people solve problems.

A good Assemblyman doesn't only vote.

A good Assemblyman helps residents navigate government, whether they're dealing with housing issues, state agencies, benefits, licensing problems, or bureaucratic red tape.

That's what public service is supposed to be.

At its core, this campaign is about one thing:

GIVING CROWN HEIGHTS A STRONGER VOICE.

A voice for the families struggling with tuition.

A voice for the parents concerned about safety.

A voice for the residents who want a say in the future of their neighborhood.

A voice for the institutions that serve our community every day.

I am running because Crown Heights deserves representation that fights for them, answers to them, and stands with them.

I am running because our community deserves a seat at the table when decisions are made.

THE NUMBERS TELL STORY

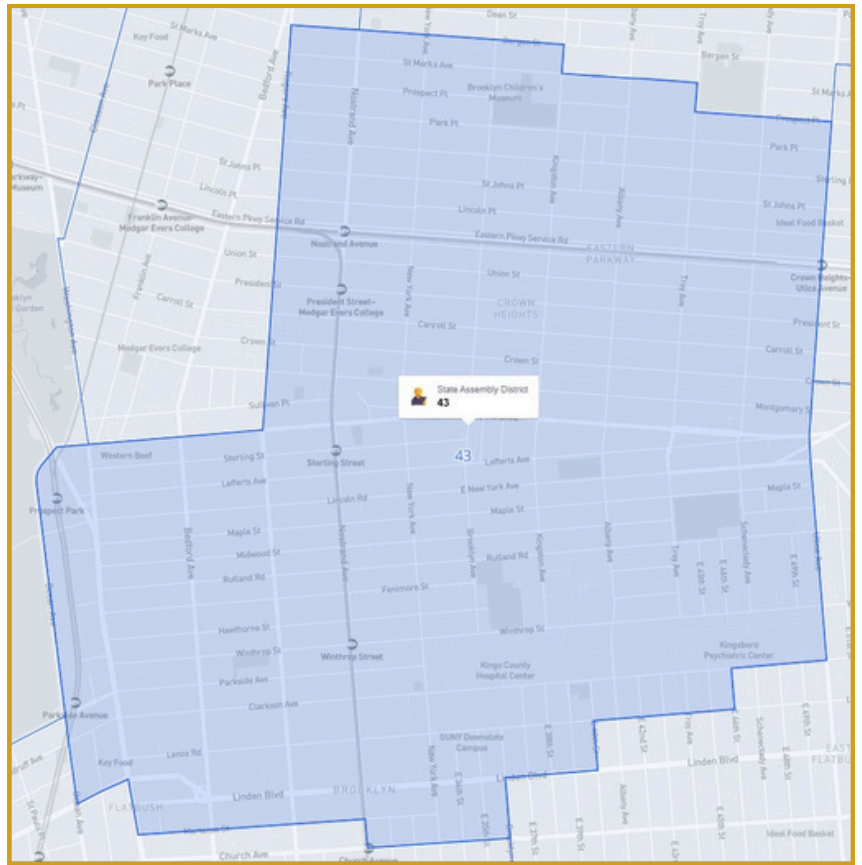
There are approximately **73,500 active registered Democratic voters in the district**. In an election year like this one, with historically low turnout, a governor running unopposed, and no presidential election on the ballot, **overall turnout is expected to be only 10%–15%, or roughly 7,000–11,000 voters.**

Within the Crown Heights Jewish community alone, there are more than 6,000 registered Democratic voters. If our community turns out in strong numbers, we can have a decisive impact on the outcome and put ourselves in a position to win.

So far, however, **only about 1,000 people have voted during the first five days of voting.** Based on **current trends, total turnout may end up below 6,000 voters districtwide,** meaning **a winning candidate could potentially need only around 3,000 votes.**

The election will be decided by turnout. The path to victory is clear—it is all in the numbers.
